Gas Engine Ladies Alert Again! Cookie time!

We need cookies, donuts, sweet rolls or what ever you usually send. This year the Health Department has issued a requirement that each package of cookies show the ingredients. Wilda worked with them and has reached a simpler way of handling there requirements. When you send your cookies etc, send a card with your recipe or ingredients with your initials attached to the package. If you send more than one kind of cookies or food items, attach ingredient list with each item. If the cookies are sold with 3 or 4 cookies in a package there has to be a sticker on each package with your initial. The ingredient card will be put in a card file. If a customer asks if the cookies have wheat flour in it the ladies can look at the ingredient card and say, yes or no.

Food items sold at the Steam show this year from both Ladies auxiliaries have the same problem.

The Health Department requires that any food item sold must have an ingredient list attached to each package. The ladies worked out a method with the Health Department using only your initial on each individual package and the ingredient card be put an a card file. Your ingredients list will not be given out.

Example: If you make 3 dozen cookies, donuts, hot rolls etc and package them 3 or 4 per pack, you need to send an ingredient card with your initials on it and a sticker on each pack with your initial. Then if someone asks what's in them, we will be able to refer back to your list and tell them in case they have allergies to certain foods.

If you don't have the small stickers, do the packaging and send the ingredient list and the ladies can do the rest. We need the food items. And again THANKS for your patience. Betty, Ellen & Wilda

The Green Thing

In the line at the store, the cashier told an older woman that she should bring her own grocery bags because plastic bags weren't good for the environment.

The woman apologized to him and explained, "We didn't have the green thing back in my day." The clerk responded, "That's our problem today. Your generation did not care enough to save our environment."

He was right -- our generation didn't have the green thing in our day.

Back then, we returned milk bottles, soda bottles and beer bottles to the store. The store sent them back to the plant to be washed and sterilized and refilled, so it could use the same bottles over and over. So they really were recycled.

But we didn't have the green thing back in our day.

We walked up stairs, because we didn't have an escalator in every store and office building. We walked to the grocery store and didn't climb into a 300-horsepower machine every time we had to go two blocks.

But he was right. We didn't have the green thing in our day.

Back then, we washed the baby's diapers because we didn't have the throw-away kind. We dried clothes on a line, not in an energy gobbling machine burning up 220 volts -- wind and solar power really did dry the clothes. Kids got hand-me-down clothes from their brothers or sisters, not always brand-new clothing. But he is right; **we didn't have the green thing back in our day.**

Back then, we had one TV, or radio, in the house -- not a TV in every room. And the TV had a small screen the size of a handkerchief (remember them?), not a screen the size of the state of Montana..

In the kitchen, we blended and stirred by hand because we didn't have electric machines to do everything for us.

When we packaged a fragile item to send in the mail, we used a wadded up old newspaper to cushion it, not Styrofoam or plastic bubble wrap.

Back then, we didn't fire up an engine and burn gasoline just to cut the lawn. We used a push mower that ran on human power. We exercised by working

so we didn't need to go to a health club to run on treadmills that operate on electricity.

But he's right; we didn't have the green thing back then.

We drank from a fountain when we were thirsty instead of using a cup or a plastic bottle every time we had a drink of water.

We refilled writing pens with ink instead of buying a new pen, and we replaced the razor blades in a razor instead of throwing away the whole razor just because the blade got dull.

But we didn't have the green thing back then.

Back then, people took the streetcar or a bus and kids rode their bikes to school or walked instead of turning their moms into a 24-hour taxi service..

We had one electrical outlet in a room, not an entire bank of sockets to power a dozen appliances. And we didn't need a computerized gadget to receive a signal beamed from satellites 2,000 miles out in space in order to find the nearest pizza joint.

But isn't it sad the current generation laments how wasteful we old folks were just because we didn't have the green thing back then?

This article must have come from a city person. We had milk from the cow and never saw a milk bottle. We went to the chicken house to get eggs. We never purchased pop to take home. We didn't have enriched sliced store bought bread until maybe early 1950's. Our first TV was 1955. Refrigerator 1948, We didn't move the outhouse inside until about 1953. I do remember the old ice box, the wood cook stove and baloney was a treat. If it got a few days old, mom would fry it. Everyone drank from one water bucket and one dipper. And what's pizza?

Our generation is where transportation started. My mother and her brother rode a horse about 3 miles to a one room grade school. She was born in 1916. My dad never did say much about going to grade school. He only lived a mile from the little town where he was raised. When I was in school we all rode a school bus to school. Kids didn't have cars then. About the best thing we had to eat was when Mom

would go to the smokehouse and take down a ham. She would unwrap it by removing the binder twine and old newspapers, cut off the mold and the hard layer of dried meat. Then cut a large piece and put it in the skillet. When the ham was done she would then make red eye gravy from the grease. With a 1/2 loaf of bread and a bowl of gravy, I could make out a meal on that. Back then with food stamps you could get Spam in a can. Ham was better. If we had any scraps left over from a meal, Mom would scrape all the plates and bowls into the slop bucket. It would then be taken to the hog pen and poured in the trough. Dad might mix a little "shorts" in to thicken it up a little before feeding it to the hogs. Before your mind runs away with you, "shorts" was ground wheat used to feed the hogs. Flour is ground wheat but more refined used to feed us.

While at the fair recently several were talking about the old days and sausage making and cracklings came up. We had several different stories about butchering hogs. On sausage making they would put all the scrap meat in a pile and grind it in to sausage. Dad would jack up the left rear wheel on the old car or pickup and tie the handle of the sausage grinder to a spoke in the wheel with a piece of cloth. Then start the car and put it in gear and this would power the sausage grinder. Some talked about rendering lard where we got the cracklings and there mother making lye soap and crackling corn bread. **And we didn't have the green thing back in our day either.**

They talk about global warming to day. We didn't have paved roads called blacktop or asphalt in our day. They were gravel from the creek not crushed limestone that we get today. In the country we used wood to heat with. Some used kerosene or coal. We didn't have propane or natural gas or even electric heat. The tough survived. And no there wasn't birth control back then. It wasn't unusual to see family with 8-10 kids and the kids all worked. Can't you just see kids today in a out-house using a Sears & Roebuck catalog for paper.

I won't get into fertilizer, I don't think kids today could handle that.

History of the Ozarks Steam Engine Club

As most of the members know, the first show was held in 1962 at Billings Missouri. It took a lot of hard work getting ready for the show. A sawmill had to be setup. All steam engines had to be hauled in on a lowboy. If I remember right, Louie McHaffie, Clovis Burrell, and Leonard Yarbrough did most of the hauling of the engines. There wasn't too many tractors or gas engines at the first show. Leonard Owens of Springfield had several model steam engines on display.

The show was held on six acres of land that was owned by Frank Stark. We had two or three stacks of grain to thrash, saw logs to saw, and even a zigzag race and many other activities lined up for that first show.

Shortly after the gates opened on Friday Morning the rain set in. It rained all day Friday and most of Saturday. Sunday was a pretty nice day, but the mud was so deep that the engines could not move. Clovis Burrell had the 75 hp Case skid engine pulling the sawmill for the entire show. This was about the only work done by a steam engine. The other engines set around smoking for the three days. We had to thrash the grain the next weekend. Even with the rain and all the mud the attendance was very good and everyone had a good time.

We owe the men that had the foresight to organize the Ozarks Steam Engine Association a big thank you.

After the Success of the first show, the members thought that it would be good to own their own show grounds.

On November 24, 1962 the Ozarks Steam Engine Association met at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Halvor Carlock in Billings MO.

The Officers elected for the coming year (1963) was:
Pres: Leonard Yarbrough

Vice Pres: Louie McHaffie
Secy/ Treas: Halvor Carlock

It was suggested that members would meet some Sunday to go look over a site for the 1963 Engine show. **January 31, 1963** a special meeting was called for the purpose of discussing the business of securing land for the 1963 Engine Show and also the probability of building a shed to house the engines and equipment. It was agreed that all who can, meet Saturday morning at 9AM, February 2, 1963 to look over a proposed site for the 1963 Engine Show. Also at this meeting, it was approved to buy 40 cords of wood for the 1963 show at \$6.00 per cord. (The minutes did not say who they bought the wood from, but wouldn't you like to buy a cord of wood today for \$6.00?)

Regular Meeting February 14, 1963.

The Treasurer gave a financial report with a balance of \$2089.63. A discussion was in order on purchasing a site for the 1963 show. **Special Meeting February 19, 1963**

The Ozarks Steam Engine Association held a Special Meeting at the home of President Leonard Yarbrough. The purpose of this meeting was whether to buy the site of ground under consideration or to rent a place. A vote was cast as to whether or not to buy a certain 17 acre tract along Highway 60.

Majority voted to wait about buying it.

The president stated that we look around for another site and report on same with ten days. The meeting was adjourned.

Special Meeting February 24, 1963

The Ozarks Steam Engine Association met at the Mayors office in Billings, Missouri on February 24, 1963

It was moved and seconded that a vote be taken concerning the purchase of 17.1 acres near the scale house on Highway 60 and 166 between Springfield and Billings Missouri. The vote was 6 to 2 in favor of buying the land.

It was moved and seconded that the president and secretary be empowered to negotiate to enter into a contract for the above stated property. Motion Carried. The president announced the resignation of Halvor Carlock as Secretary and Treasurer. Clovis Burrell was unanimously elected secretary and treasurer.

Meeting adjourned.

Many hours of hard work went into cleaning up the grounds and getting ready for the 1963 show. Sprouts had to be cut, rocks picked up, fence built. If it were not for the hard work and dedications of the members in 1963, we would not have the show grounds that we now have to host our annual show.

Many of the members not only gave of their time, but also took money out of their own pockets to help finance the show. Next time you see Louie McHaffie, give him a big **Thanks**
